COVID-19 Moving Forward

- Coursework completed spring/summer 2020, 2020-21, 2021-22 and 2022-23 academic years will still be subject to the COVID-19 exceptions.
- Standardized test scores will continue to no longer be required for NCAA initial-eligibility purposes.





COVID-19 Moving Forward

- Core-course time limitations are reverting to the pre-COVID-19 rules.
 - If a student graduates from high school on time, one core-course unit may be completed in the year after graduation (summer or academic year) and before enrolling full time at any Division I college or university.
 - For Division II, student-athletes may use an unlimited number of core courses completed after graduation (summer or academic year) and before enrolling full time at any college or university.
- Courses completed on or after September 1, 2023, via "nontraditional" programs are once again subject to review.

Nontraditional Core Courses

Courses Taught Via:

- Internet:
- · Distance learning;
- Independent study;
- Individualized instruction;
- Correspondence;
- And courses taught by similar means may be used to satisfy NCAA core-course requirements if all the following conditions are satisfied:



Nontraditional Core Courses

- For purposes of teaching, evaluating and providing assistance to the student, throughout the duration of the course:
 - Instructor and student have ongoing access to one another.
 - Instructor and student have regular interaction with one another.
- Course includes a defined time period for completion.

Core-Course Review

To be approved, a core course must:

- Meet all NCAA Core-Course Legislation.
- Meet Core Course Criteria for Review.
 - · Course Content.
 - Rigor of Assessments.

NCAA Core-Course Legislation

Must meet all the following criteria:

- Qualify for high school graduation in:
 - English.

- o World Language.
- Math (Algebra 1 or higher).
- o Comparative religion.
- o Natural or physical science.
- o Philosophy.
- o Social science.
- Considered four-year college preparatory.
 - To be considered college preparatory, a course must provide student the academic foundation for successful completion of academic work at the four-year college level.
- Taught at or above the high school's regular academic level.
- Taught by a qualified instructor.





Core-Course Review Criteria

Course Content

What students are expected to know and do by the end of the course:

- Content standards.
- Desired learning outcomes.
- Competencies.
- Scope and sequence of topics.

Rigor of Assessments

- Cognitive demand necessary to successfully complete an assignment or task.
- Course must include application of knowledge through higher-order thinking and skills.

Example of Criteria Related to Rigor of Assessments

 Generally, a course shall include (a) the application of skills and concepts, as well as (b) strategic thinking and/or (c) extended thinking.

Application of Skills and Concepts

- Requires learners to apply information, conceptual knowledge, and procedures to demonstrate subject matter mastery.
- » Uses context to identify meaning of words/phrases.

Strategic Thinking

» Requires learners to dissect large scale knowledge and information into its smaller components.

Extended Thinking

- » Requires linking multiple informational and knowledge-based elements to evaluate a concept as a whole.
- » Evaluates relevancy, accuracy, and completeness of information from multiple sources.



Core-Course Review Steps

- NCAA legislation.
- Criteria for review.
- Context of school's current list.
- Render one of the following decisions:
 - Approved.
 - Additional Information Required.
 - Not Approved.

Core-Course Review Steps

- Additional Information Required.
 - · Course description.
 - Flowchart showing where course fits, in terms of broader pathways.
 - Detailed outline of course content.
 - Three major sample assignments/assessments.
- Not Approved.
 - The following "Not Approved" decisions will open a portal for document submission:
 - RC5: Doctrinal in nature.
 - RC11: Taught below regular academic level.
 - RC12: Not considered four-year college prep.
 - RC17: Does not meet core-course guidelines.



Special Scenarios

Weighted Grading Scales

- Weighted grades may be used for initial-eligibility purposes if:
 - Course title indicates the course is taught at an advanced level.
 - Example: Honors, Pre-IB, Advanced, IB, AP.
 - Weight can only be added in terms of quality points after numeric grades have been converted to letter grades. Weight added to a numeric grade in terms of a multiplier cannot be used.
 - Note: One additional quality point may be assigned.
- To view your school's current grading scale information on file, access your school's NCAA account.
 - To submit grading scale information, email official school grading policies to ec-highschool@ncaa.org.





Special Scenarios

Pre-Ninth Grade and Dual-Enrollment Courses

- High school courses completed prior to the start of ninth grade may be used to satisfy core-course requirements if the course:
 - Is on a high school's list of NCAA-approved core courses.
 - Is shown on a high school transcript with grade and high school credit awarded.
- Dual-enrollment courses may be used to satisfy NCAA core-course requirements if the course:
 - Is shown on a high school transcript with grade and high school credit awarded.
 - Meets all other requirements for core courses.
 - Note: Weight cannot be added to dual-enrollment courses.



All High School Counselors

- Know which courses are NCAA approved for having student-athletes enroll in them.
- Assist student-athletes navigating the recruiting process.
- Remind students to register with the NCAA Eligibility Center.
- Remind student-athletes to apply to the colleges and universities recruiting them.



- Keep your core-course list updated.
 - Review the High School Review Policies and Procedures.
- Submit "nontraditional" programs for review.
 - · Online or distance learning.
 - Blended or hybrid.
 - Independent study.
- Respond to open tasks.
- Upload transcripts.
- Attest to fee waivers.



Managing Your Core-Course List

- · Add new titles.
- Archive old course titles.
- Upload documentation when courses are applied:
 - "Additional Information Required" decisions (RC8).
 - "Not Approved" decisions (RC5,RC11, RC12, & RC17).
 - Course description.
 - Unit-by-unit or week-by-week outline of content.
 - · Flow chart.
 - Sample assignments and assessments.



"Nontraditional" Programs

- Call customer service to request a program review.
 - 877-622-2321.
- Be prepared to answer questions about how your school's implements the "nontraditional" program.
- Distance and e-learning program reviews were paused spring/summer 2020 through the 2022-23 academic year.

Courses completed using a "nontraditional" program on or after September 1, 2023, will be subject to the program review process.


- Tasks could be assigned to your school for a variety of reasons.
